Rebuilding Solano – Glen Branaman informed council that the smoke installation drive for Vacaville will be happening in Vacaville in April or May.


Adjunct duties and other issues at Vaca Pena - were discussed with council and feedback was taken.



Dear Brothers and Sisters,

Thank you for your ongoing support of the NALC Letter Carriers' Food Drive.

This year, the Food Bank of Contra Costa and Solano is requesting sponsorships of \$1,000 dollars in support of the Letter Carriers' "Stamp Out Hunger" Food Drive on May 14, 2016.

For over 20 years, the National Association of Letter Carriers has been conducting the largest single day food drive in the United States. This Union effort brings in more than 100,000 pounds of food. The nationwide total is usually over 70 million pounds. The timing is critical, as most of the holiday food collection has been distributed, and many families with children will be



without the school meal programs they rely on in the coming summer.

We are asking local Unions to sponsor grocery bags that the carriers will deliver as a reminder of the drive. These bags are Union made and Union printed. The logos of sponsoring locals will be prominently displayed on the front.
